UNANIMOUS CONSENT AGREEMENT

Ordered, That when the Senate proceeds to consider the nomination of Bob Martinez to be Director of National Drug Control Policy (Cal. No. 32), it be considered under a 90 minute time agreement, equally divided between the Chairman and Ranking Member of the Committee on the Judiciary, that following the conclusion or yielding back of time, the Senate vote on the nomination, without any intervening action, that the motion to reconsider be laid upon the table, that the President be immediately notified of the Senate's action and that the Senate return to legislative session.
